

Flu Vaccine for Door County Employees/Dependents—Please share with any employee who does not have email. This will also be on the County website, under Public Health Department.

The Door County Public Health Department will be offering seasonal influenza vaccines to all Door County employees at no charge. Employees who have dependents on the County insurance plan will also be able to receive influenza vaccine from the Public Health Department.

If you are a Door County employee or adult dependent who is covered by the Door County health insurance plan, please bring your insurance card with you.

If you have children who are covered by the Door County health insurance plan and you would like them to receive their flu vaccine from our department, we will need you to call our department (920-746-2234) to schedule an appointment for your child.

If you are a Door County employee who is not covered by the Door County health insurance plan, just come, fill in our form, and you will receive the flu vaccine from our department.

We will be offering several clinics at different times and locations. In some departments, we will be offering the vaccine following staff meetings.

Please feel free to attend any of the employee flu clinics, or call us at the health department (920-746-2234) to schedule a separate appointment if you are unable to attend any of the clinics listed.

Employees/adult dependents can also receive the vaccine at our scheduled public clinics. See schedule on County website www.co.door.wi.gov. Just be sure to let us know that you are a county employee.

So here is the plan, in summary:

1. Any employee can come to the clinic that is most convenient and receive vaccine.
2. If you are on the county health insurance plan, bring your Auxiant county health insurance card with you.
3. If you are an employee's adult dependent covered by Auxiant county health insurance, select clinic that is most convenient, bring Auxiant insurance card, and receive vaccine.
4. If your children are covered by the Auxiant county health insurance, call 920-746-2234 to make an appointment, bring Auxiant card to appointment, and receive vaccine.

Influenza (flu) can be a very serious disease with many complications. Symptoms of influenza include fever, muscle aches, sore throat, and a non-productive cough. More serious illness can occur if pneumonia follows. According to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), everyone 6 months and older should get a flu vaccine this fall.

The health department will be giving the quadrivalent vaccine this year, which includes protection from four different viruses. For years, flu vaccines were designed to protect against three different flu viruses (trivalent). By adding another B virus to the vaccine, quadrivalent vaccines may give broader protection.

Most healthy adults may be able to infect others beginning 1 day **before** symptoms develop and up to 5 to 7 days **after** becoming sick. Children may pass the virus for longer than 7 days. Symptoms start 1 to 4 days after the virus enters the body. **That means that you may be able to pass on the flu to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as while you are sick.** Some persons can be infected with the flu virus but have no symptoms.
